2. Review and Approve Agen		Agenda approved as written.
3. Overview and Timeline for the Review Process		Krista outlined a draft timetable for the review and adoption process for the residential portion of the code. The first step, reviewing the changes from the 2018 International Energy Conservation Code and developing a report of significant changes, needs to be completed by February 6. The Council will then initiate the code change proposal period, which at this time is estimated to be from mid-February through mid-April. The TAG would then need to begin meeting again to review code change proposals. The review needs to be completed by the end of May. Hearings will be scheduled in September 2019, and the final adoption decision will be made in November 2019.
Review of Residential Integrated Draft		The TAG members went through the Integrated Draft changes from the 2018 IECC. Krista noted that there was an additional change made to correlate with the Commercial portion—mandatory has been struck from section headings and a table inserted into Section R405 showing the mandatory provisions when complying through modeling.

Chapter 5	se cc R in ul oi	2/R503.1.2: The TAG members discussed the change to these ections, which go from a laundry list of sections for new heating and poling systems compliance to a general "shall comply with Section 1403." Some members felt it was confusing, since the reference now acreased the scope and included items like pools and spas. However, altimately the TAG determined to maintain the change, noting that the only items needed to comply were those portions of the heating/cooling system being installed/replaced.
