Enforceable code language must be used. Amend section to read as follows:

104.2.4.1 Individual cases.

The *fire code official* shall have the authority to grant modifications for individual cases, provided that the *fire code official* shall first find that special individual reason makes the strict letter of this code impractical and the modification is in compliance with the intent and purpose of this code and that such modification does not lessen health, life and fire safety requirements. The details of action granting modifications shall be recorded and entered in the files of the code compliance agency.

104.2.4.2 Natural Disasters

In preparation for, during and after a natural disaster event, as determined by the *fire code official*, the *fire code official* shall have the authority to issue written policies, procedures or rules that modify this code as necessary to protect life and property. Such polices, procedures or rules shall be made available to the public and shall include start and end dates, which can be extended at the *fire code official's* discretion.

5. Briefly explain your proposed amendment, including the purpose, benefits and problems addressed. We propose not adopting these sections of the model code because they offer broad powers to local jurisdiction officials to make substantial changes to the code with no oversight and little restrictions.

RCW 34.05.630(2) states that policies and procedures that are used in place of a rule, without being adopted in accordance with all applicable laws, may be subject to review by the Joint Administrative Review Committee. If the model code is adopted, it may result in local jurisdictions modifying the code in a substantial way that violates the intent of the Administrative Procedure Act and Regulatory Fairness Act and without having direct approval for the changes by the State Building Code Council.

Therefore, we believe it is in the best interest of the state to not adopt these sections of the model code.
