Welcome and Introductions	The session was called to order at 1:00 p.m. by Council Chair Todd Beyreuther.
2. Public Listening Session on Economic Impacts for proposed amendments:	Dustin Curb provided an overview of how the "Listening Session" is structured and noted the SBCC is seeking additional input from the public regarding economic impacts resulting from proposed changes to the 2024 Washington State Building Codes. Information gathered will assist the SBCC in its determination that the probable benefits of the rules are greater than their probable costs. In addition, the SBCC would like to hear from small businesses on topics such as the cost of compliance (including costs of equipment, supplies, labor, training, professional services, and increased administrative costs), changes to sales or revenue, job creation or loss and whether changes have greater impact on small businesses.
